
Fiscal Year 2021-2022 Revenues

Youth Alliance has supported youth and their families by bringing in more than \$38 million in resources over the past 32 years to address crisis prevention, substance use prevention, early childhood development, youth employment, and youth asset development. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, program and cash revenues totaled \$1,952,165. Volunteers logged 2,035 hours valued at \$64,713. Inkind donations totaled \$67,500. Overall, the Youth Alliance's total contributed resources for the FY 22-23 were valued at \$2,084,377.

Engaging Community Partners to Improve the Lives of Children and Families

Substance Abuse Prevention

Prescription Take Back has been one of our Substance Use Prevention initiatives since 2010. This partnership with the St. Joseph Police Department and the Buchanan County Drug Strike Force holds bi-annual events to collect unused prescription medication from the community. Prescription Take Back aims to provide a safe, convenient, and responsible means of disposing of prescription drugs, while also educating the general public about the potential for abuse of medications. To date, we have collected and disposed of 16,077 lbs. of drugs in our community.

"Opioids are a significant problem and have resulted in a substantial number of overdose deaths in our community over the last ten years. Unused pain medications are one of the primary supply sources for those individuals that have an opioid addiction problem. By providing a safe, reliable and easy method for citizens to get these medications out of their homes, the greater the chance we have at reducing these tragic deaths," said Larry Stobbs, retired Sergeant with the St. Joseph Police Department.

Early Childhood Development

Educare

Educare provides free resources, technical assistance and training opportunities to child care providers who accept state subsidy. Educare works to improve the early learning experiences for low-income children from birth to six years-of-age. Since these children are not yet attending school, the goal for Educare is to help ensure children receive a solid foundation for school success and are ready to enter kindergarten.

Infant Toddler Specialist Network (ITSN)

ITSN provides on-site consulting, coaching and training with child care center directors and infant/toddler teachers. These services are available to child care centers who accept state subsidy. The ITSN program works to improve the quality of care and education that infants and toddlers receive while away from their primary caregivers. ITSN services increase the knowledge level and competencies of infant and toddler teachers and directors.
